

906 Spruceway Abilene, Kansas

The history to the Modernistic style house built at 906 Spruceway with the legal description of "All south 50 ft of Lot 6 except the west 154 feet and except the east 12 feet" is quite easy to follow. There have only been two families living in the house since its construction in 1939 by Charles and Donna Brainard.

The deeds can be traced back to 1905 when C. Stevens (single) sold the south 50 ft of Lot 6, Rice and Augustine's Addition to the City of Abilene, Kansas to James Bolster¹, who was a carpenter².

In 1911 Mr. Bolster sold the property to Harriet E. Geauque³, wife of Louis who was a farmer⁴. Louis passed away in 1922 and Harriet in 1930⁵.

In 1916 Harriet Geauque sold the land to Elmer Hoyt⁶. Elmer and his wife, Florence, owned and operated a grocery store in the Upland area that was founded by his father in the late 1800's⁷.

In 1918, two and a half years later, the Holt's sold the land to H. G. (Horace Greely) & Anna Kyle. H. G. was "prominent in the Republican politics in Kansas for 25 years, former state representative and state senator as well as a member of the state board of agriculture. He was killed instantly when his motorcar was struck by a Santa Fe engine at a railroad crossing near Strong city, KS on Friday, February 27, 1925. The accident occurred near Neva, four miles northwest of Strong City. Mr. Kyle, who was an agent for the Aetna building & Loan association of Topeka, was on his way toward Abilene. Alfred Schroer, a farmer of Neva, witnessed the accident, saying Kyle evidently did not see the approaching engine. Kyle's body was carried a distance of 400 feet and his car was carried on the engine pilot for nearly half a mile. Mr. Kyle was property examiner for the Aetna Building & Loan association of Kansas. His duties consisted of making investigations of property before the association made loans on it. He was associated with the Aetna Building & Loan association for the past two years."⁸

In 1923 H. G. & wife sold the land to Jessie E. Flint⁹ who was a district Manager for the telephone company¹⁰.

Four years later Jesse and his wife sold all of the south 50 ft of Lot 6 except the west 154 feet and the east 12 feet to C. L. Brown of United Telephone. In 1935 when C. L. passed away¹¹ the property was then inherited by his wife Maude who in 1938 sold to Donna G. Brainard¹², the daughter of Alva and

Retta Duckwall of the Duckwall Stores¹³. Donna married Charles L. Brainard in 1930 and moved to Minnesota where he taught at the University of Minnesota, in Minneapolis for seven years before they returned to Abilene and he became associated with the Duckwall Stores. He served on the Board of Directors of the Duckwall-Alco Stores and the Eisenhower Foundation¹⁴. Donna passed away in 1986¹⁵ and Charles in 1988¹⁶.

In 1993 Sean and Laurie Hilton purchased the home from the estate of Donna G. Brainard¹⁷. Laurie Quit Claim Deeded the house/proper to Sean in 1994¹⁸ and Sean is now the proud owner of that the home the Brainerd's built.

Note: The following article was written by Lynda Millner, Dickinson County Historical Society Director in September 1981 when the home was on the fall Homes Tour:

In August 1939, the new home of Mr. and Mrs. C. L. Brainard was opened to the public as a "designer's showcase" type of home that was unique to the Abilene area.

The depression had taken its toll on productivity in the building business and Abilene had become a dead town, having had no new residential construction to speak of in years.

Mr. Brainard recalls that the project was part of a Chamber of Commerce plan to revitalize the economy of the Abilene area. It became a community project with local builders, tradesmen and merchants providing the very latest in materials and furnishings to the Brainards who designed the home themselves.

Charles Brainard is an architect and artist and Donna Brainard, the daughter of A. L. Duckwall Sr., is an accomplished artist with a B.S. degree in architecture.

Their home was built and furnished with the very best materials that were available in the building industry at the time. The unique and very special thing about the Brainard home is that it has not been altered or changed in any way since 1939 with the exception of the addition of an entry hole and storage closet to the front of the building. The furnishings are in perfect harmony with the simplistic lines of the house.

"Modern" is thought by many to have its roots in the 50's, but, in fact, the 30's produced the most prized and renowned furnishings and architecture that are associated with "Modern" as a recognized design style. I

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recently saw furnishings and room settings similar to the Brainard's in the Metropolitan Museum of Art's Interior Design Gallery in New York City.

The home is a model of efficiency with every detail having a functional purpose. "A place for everything and everything in its place" has taken on a new meaning since my visit to the Brainard home. Planning and forethought are evident throughout completely eliminating the clutter that is so much a part of my life !

The following is taken from the August. 20, 1939 Abilene Daily Chronicle and is still accurate in every detail some 52 years later.

"First of all, a hillside location was chosen so that the garage could be placed under the terrace in front of the house. This brings the car, which has become an American necessity, closer to the house and is readily accessible from basement or front door."

"The plan follows the traditional Regency idea with square boxlike building and hip roof, except that corner windows have been used to give more space for furniture in the interior."

"One unique feature of the house is that there is no plaster in the entire building. The walls are all covered with fiber type wallboard which weighs one-eighth as much as plaster."

"The house has seven rooms and two baths in addition to the basement which contains the amusement and general utility rooms. Glass block windows are used throughout the basement."

Visiting the Brainard's home is like taking a trip back in time to 1939."¹⁹

And that statement is very true today (2018). The current owner, Sean Hilton, has preserved the home with only a very slight exception – for safety purposes, he removed the center glass blocks on the west wall of the dining room and had custom made French doors installed. He also replaced the garage doors in 2009. Sean has bragging rights as he has all the documentation pertaining to the construction of the home, to include photographs. The home remains just as it has since its date of construction, over 79 years ago.

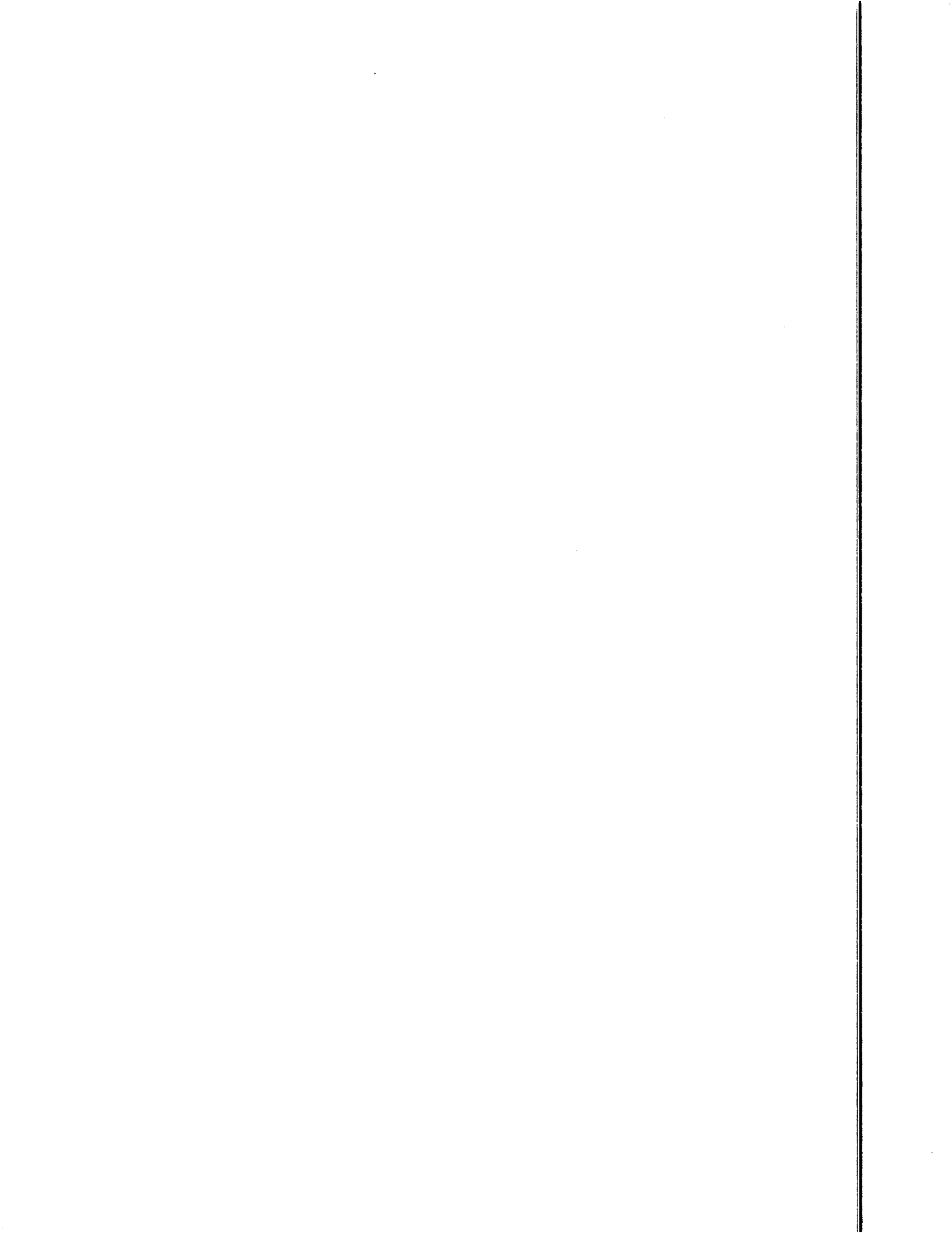
SENATOR KYLE KILLED

Brainard Home Is Showcase

BY LYNDA MILLNER

In August of 1939, the new home of Mr. and Mrs. C.L. Brainard was opened to the public as a "designer's showcase" type of home that was unique to the Abilene area.

The depression had taken its toll on productivity in the building business and Abilene had become a dead town, having had no new residential construction to speak of in years.

Mr. Brainard recalls that the project was part of a Chamber of Commerce plan to revitalize the economy of the Abilene area. It became a community project with local builders, tradesmen and merchants providing the very latest in materials and furnishings to the Brainards who designed the home themselves.

Charles Brainard is an architect and artist and

Donna Brainard, the daughter of A.L. Duckwall, Sr., is an accomplished artist with a B.S. degree in architecture.

Their home was built and furnished with the very best materials that were available in the building industry at the time. The unique and very special thing about the Brainard home is that it has not been altered or changed in any way since 1939 with the exception of the addition of an entry hole and storage closet to the front of the building. The furnishings are in perfect harmony with the simplistic lines of the house.

"Modern" is thought by many to have its roots in the 50's, but, in fact, the 30's produced the most prized and renowned furnishing and architecture that are associated with "Modern" as a recognized design

style. I recently saw furnishings and room settings similar to the Brainard's in the Metropolitan Museum of Arts Interior Design Gallery in New York City.

The home is a model of efficiency with every detail having a functional purpose. "A place for everything and everything in its place" has taken on a new meaning since my visit to the Brainard home. Planning and forethought are evident throughout completely eliminating the clutter that is so much a part of my life!

The following is taken from the Aug. 20, 1939 Abilene Daily Chronicle and is still accurate in every detail some 52 years later.

"First of all, a hillside location was chosen so that the garage could be placed under the terrace in front of the house. This brings the car, which has become

an American necessity, closer to the house and is readily accessible from basement or front door."

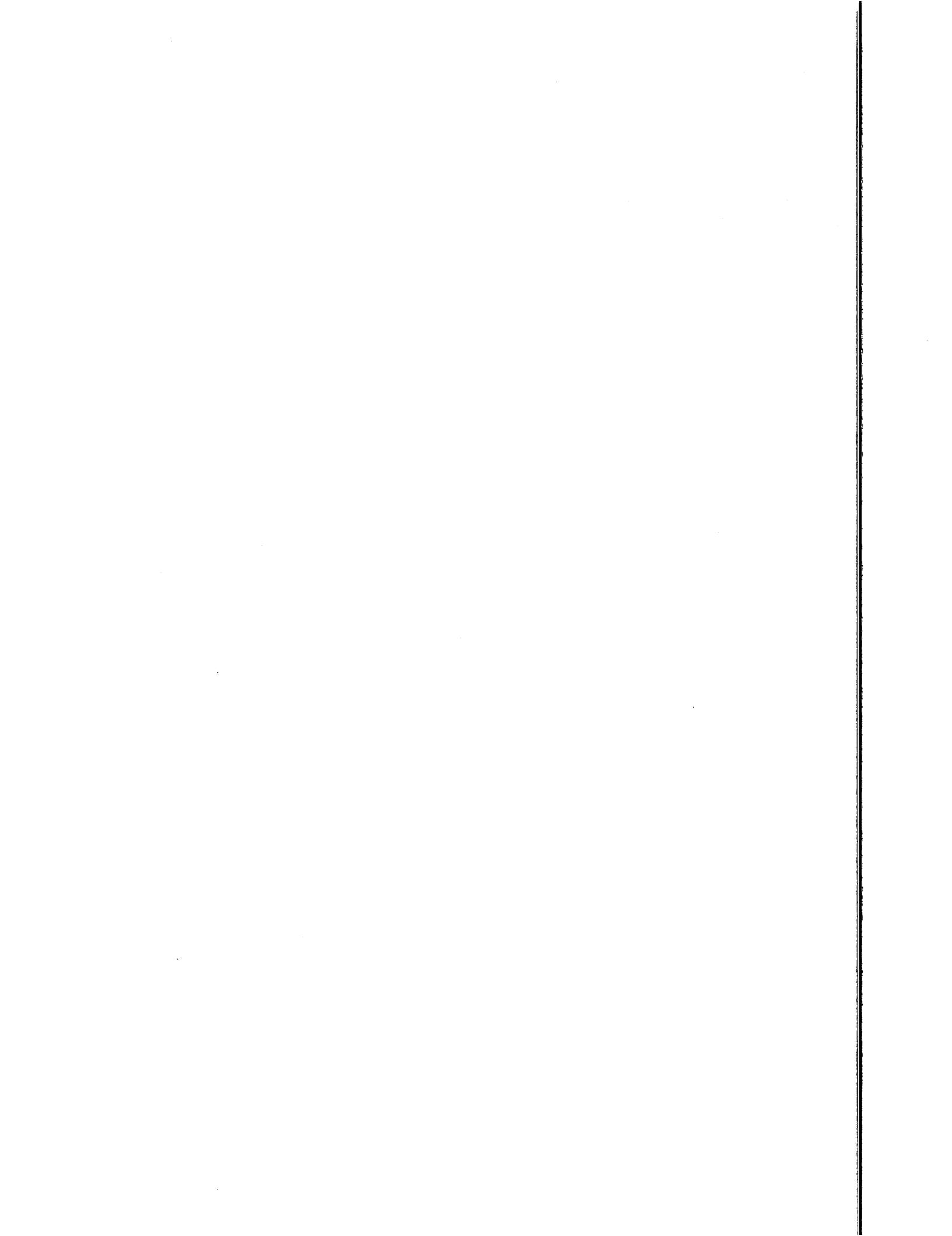
"The plan follows the traditional Regency idea with square boxlike building and hip roof, except that corner windows have been used to give more space for furniture in the interior."

"One unique feature of the house is that there is no plaster in the entire building. The walls are all covered with fibre type wallboard which weighs one-eighth as much as plaster."

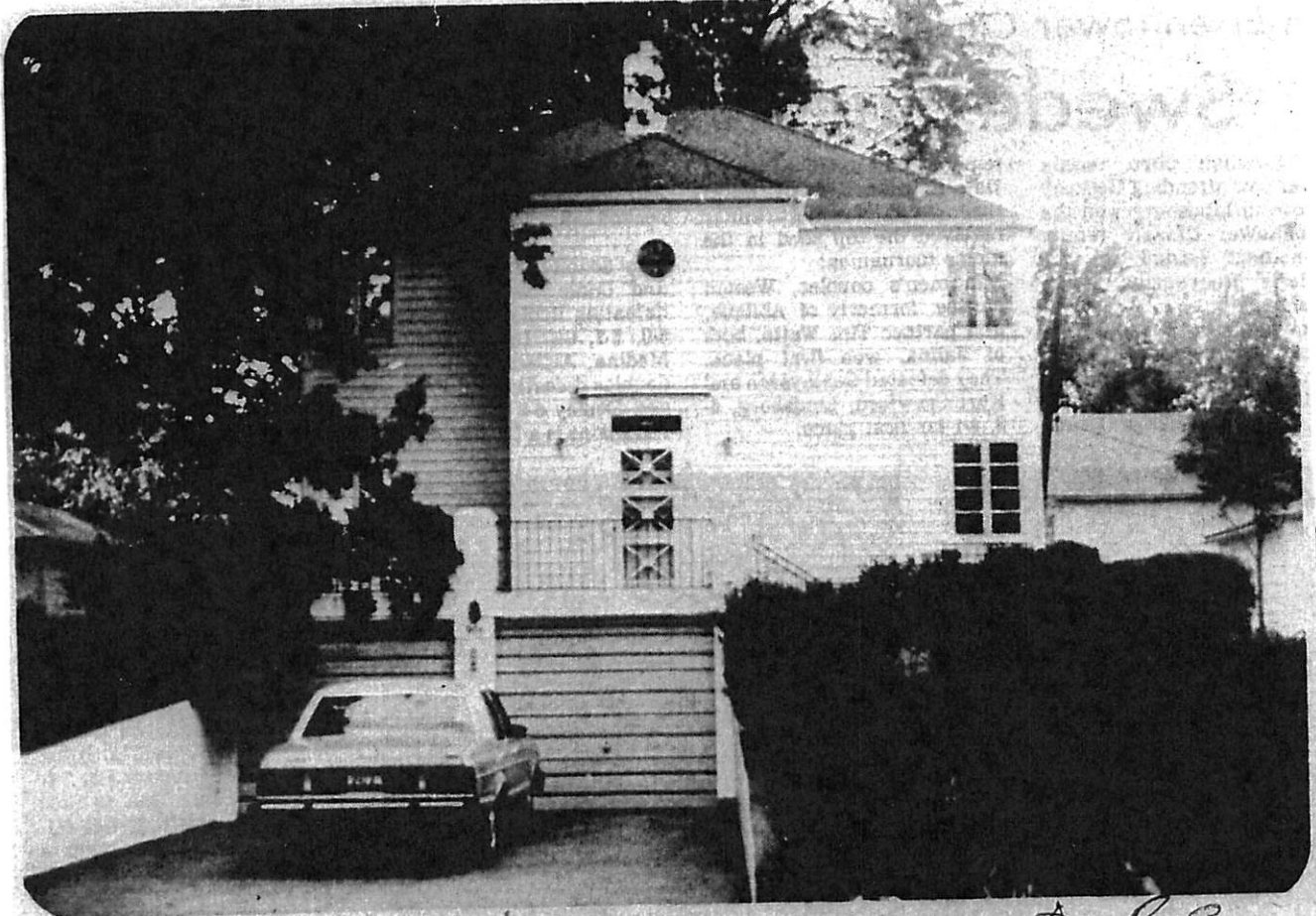
"The house has seven rooms and two baths in addition to the basement which contains the amusement and general utility rooms. Glass block windows are used throughout the basement."

Visiting the Brainard's home is like taking a trip back in time to 1939.

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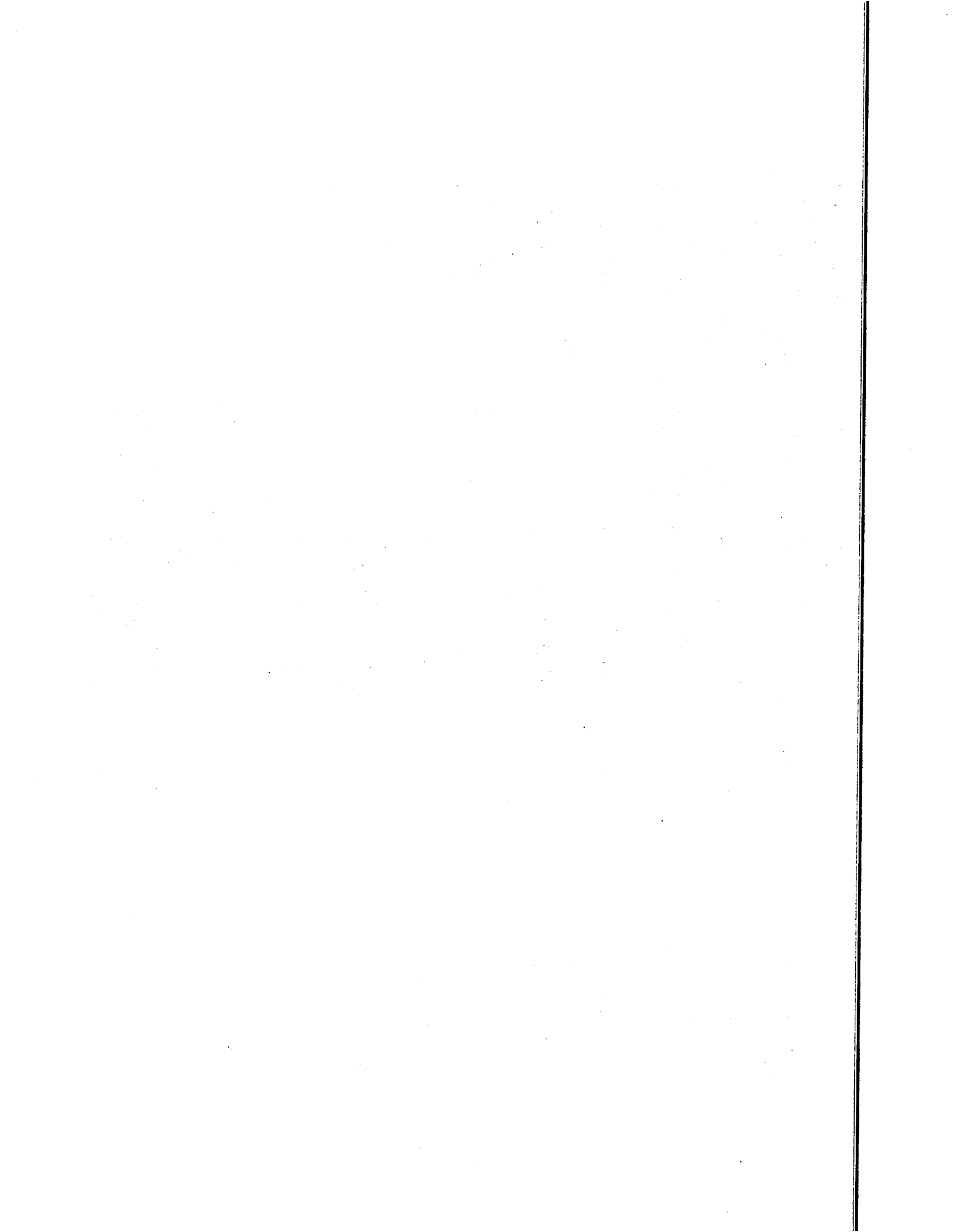
